## Part A: Pupil premium strategy plan

### Statement of intent

At Elmtree Infant and Nursery School, we have a clear strategy to further improve the attainment of the disadvantaged learners within our school community. Our disadvantaged learners include pupils for whom we currently receive the pupil premium grant, those pupils who are working with a social worker and those who are recently adopted from care as well as any other learners who may find themselves at a disadvantage. We aim for all our pupils to maximise their academic and social, emotional and behavioural potential in order for them to have high aspirations and a lifelong love of learning.

Our strategy is based upon providing support via quality first teaching for all, targeted support and using other approaches for pupils with specific needs. We have used a range of evidence bases, including the DfE recommended Education Endowment Foundation (EEF) Toolkit, to inform us of

strategies of support that will have the maximum amount of impact on the learning outcomes for our disadvantaged pupils.

There is an ongoing review of the impact of strategies using a variety of monitoring activities such as: Pupil Progress Meetings, Book Scrutiny, Data Analysis, Learning Walks and Pupil Voice.

## Challenges

This details the key challenges to achievement that we have identified among our disadvantaged pupils.

Challenge number	Detail of challenge
1	Attendance and punctuality: Regular punctual attendance and readiness to learn is a challenge for a small minority of our disadvantaged pupils. Currently, November 22, attendance for PP pupils sits at 93%.
2	Multiple barriers to learning. Some disadvantaged pupils also have a SEND.
3	'Catch-up': Levels of engagement in Preschool and prior Nursery school education varied during the last few years (pandemic). As a result, there are some pupils who need 'catch-up' so that they are working at age-related expectations, specifically in social skills and communication.
4	Weak language and communication skills.
5	Many of our children lack the cultural capital needed to access the curriculum

## Intended outcomes

## **Part B: Review of outcomes in the previous academic year**

### **Pupil premium strategy outcomes**

This details the impact that our pupil premium activity had on pupils in the 2021 to 2022 academic year.

Attendance: for the academic year 2021-22 attendance for PP pupils was 87.2% as our families struggled with the impact of the pandemic and returning to school. We know that this needs to further improve and for November 22 attendance for PP pupils sits at 93.2%.

25% of our disadvantaged pupils met the expected standard and the other 75% have made good progress towards it. Of these 75%, 6 pupils, 3 are expected to achieve the standard by the end of year 2.

86% of our pupils met the expected standard in reading by the end of year 2. Of the 8 pupils who did not meet the standard, 7 had SEND, 3 of whom had EHCP's, 2 attended the ARP as part of their EHCP's and 1 pupil was disapplied in line with their development. They will continue to work on phonetic acquisition as part of their EHCP and within their new setting.

50% of pupils met expected standard in reading, of the 29 pupils that did not reach the expected standard, 9 pupils were from the disadvantaged group, 9 pupils with SEND- 3 of whom are in the disadvantaged group.

19% of pupils met expected standards in writing, of the 47 pupils that did not reach the expected standard all 14 disadvantage pupils, 10 pupils with SEND- 3 of whom are in the disadvantaged group. With 86% of the cohort now passed the phonics screening check it is expected that these children will continue to use their skills to apply to their writing.

38% of pupils met expected standards in Maths, of the 32 pupils that did not reach the expected standard, 12 pupils were from the disadvantaged group, 12 were from the SEND group of who 2 were also from the disadvantaged group.

The oral language skills of our PP pupils improved and we know this because we monitored pupil voice, ensured pupils were expected to answer questions in full sentences rather than a few words and teachers/ staff were able to target questions and assess progress in class. The curriculum was further developed to included expected vocabulary as well as aspirational vocabulary.

We have clear evidence that Zones of Regulation has improved pupil behaviour and well being. All pupils use this intuitively and as a result more pupils are ready to engage in lessons. We experienced less 'low level' behavioural disruption across the school.

The children in Nurture group have very specific assessments on entry and exit, these demonstrated that children were improving their emotional literacy and personal development, making their access to the wider curriculum more successful.
